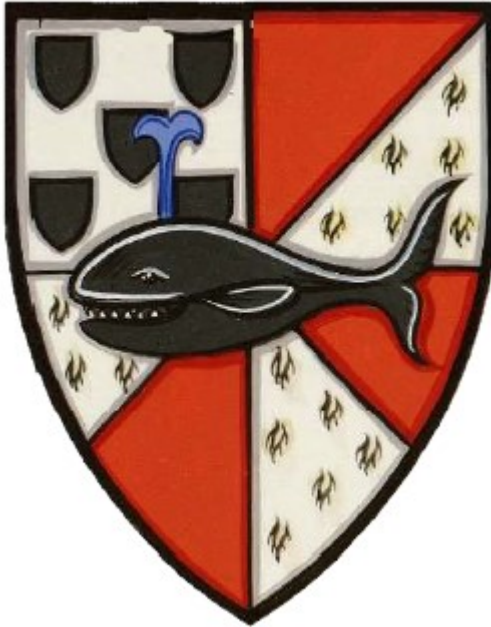




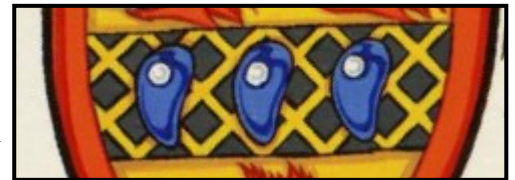
Birds 3: **WATER CREATURES**

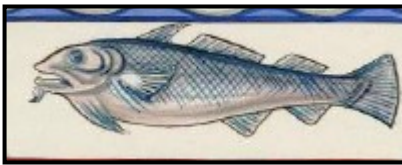


On the left we have a spouting whale,

On the right we have mussels

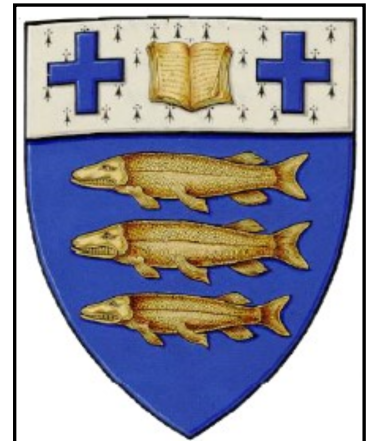


These mussels have pearls in them!

The three pikes on the right are known as GEDS in heraldry and this the coat of arms of a man called GEDDES. This is called “canting arms” when the symbols seem to “sing out” the name of the owner.



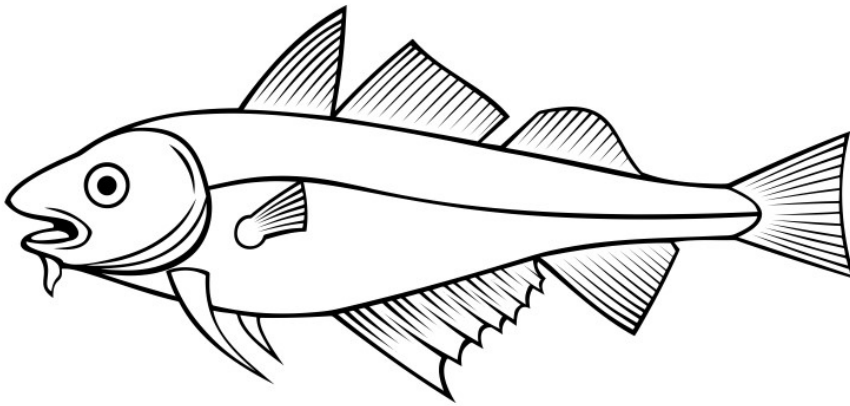
These three turbot on the left are another example of CANTING ARMS as the owner is a Miss TORBET. The motto is clever too—adapted from psalm 81 “Sing we merrily unto God.”

We know it is a lady because the diamond-shaped shield is often used for ladies.

On the right we see the great Poseidon, the sea god with his trident, and a dolphin at his feet.

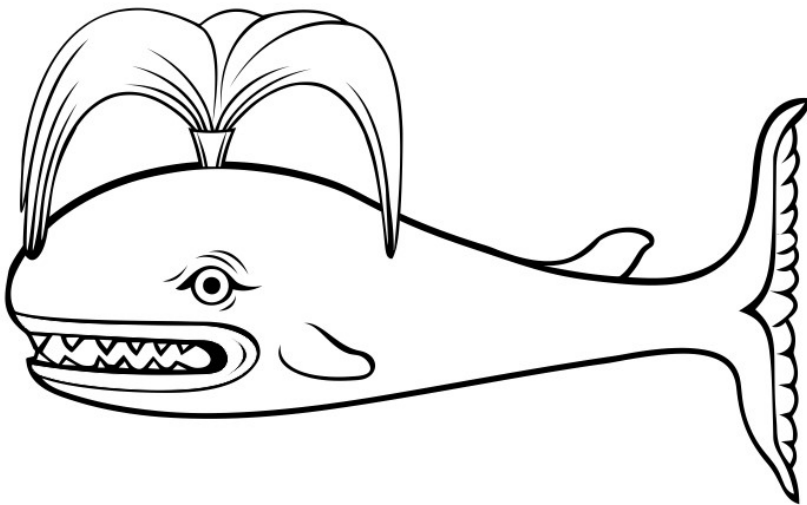
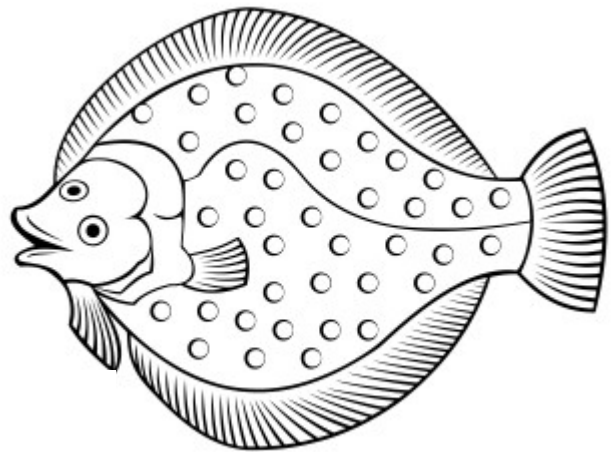
